I am not surprised that our state legislators are choosing to push through SJR 8207, which would change our state Constitution and lower the passage rate for school bonds to 50% plus one, from the current 60% needed. This "school problem" has been ongoing for the 50 years I've been voting. Are we going to wait another 50 years while the school districts continue to either push these bonds/levies down our throats by covering up the problems like this legislation they've initiated or are we going to demand to be heard?
